Dear Reader,

The picture in this article was taken when Metropolitan Isaiah of Denver visited our community of St. Dionysios to bless the newly mounted icons in our Church. Metropolitan Isaiah is pictured with an extension pole with a "Mater" paint brush mounted on the end to distribute the Holy Chrism "the seal of the gift of the Holy Spirit" (II Corinthians 1:21-22) held by his Deacon Rev. Paul Zaharas. Fr. Nicholas Papadopoulos – Papedo along with two altar boys, Spencer Zeiler and Nicky Papedo, are assisting the Metropolitan in prayers and chanting with the Church choir. His Eminence, Metropolitan Isaiah, processed around the Church and anointed all twelve new large icons with the Holy Chrism that He personally brought with him for this special occasion. The Holy Chrism was blessed by the Holy Synod of Bishops from the Patriarch of Constantinople. This same Holy Chrism or myrrh (miron) is used in the Sacrament of Holy Baptism when a newly enlightened Christian is brought into the faith of Orthodox Christianity.

Annually Metropolitan Isaiah visits our community to celebrate the remembrance of the event of the transference of the Holy relics of St. Dionysios from the Islands of the Strophades to the Island of Zakynthos on August 24.

In the Orthodox Christian theology, the Church teaches that when an element of nature is prayed over by the body of the Church, its members, and sanctified by the Holy Spirit, it no longer is just that element, but has mystically been altered to become an agent of God's divine Grace. For example, when wine



and bread are offered to God during the sacrament of the Divine Liturgy, the wine and bread are mystically altered to the Body and Blood of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. It is no longer just wine and bread. It is not just a symbol. But for Orthodox Christians it is the body and blood of Christ.

When the Synod of Bishops of the Patriarchate of Constantinople prayed over the oil presented to them on the Wednesday of Holy Week before Holy Pascha, the oil was mystically changed to Holy Chrism and becomes the seal of the gift of the Holy Spirit of God. It is no longer just oil nor should it be referred to as "just oil". It is now the presence of the Grace of the Holy Spirit of God which has been awarded to either a person, a Holy Icon or a consecrated Orthodox Church (as was St. Dionysios Greek Orthodox Christian Church).

I invite all of you to come and see our wonderful new icons that have been blessed by the Holy Chrism. These icons are now truly "windows to the kingdom of heaven" and depict for all who gaze upon them, the Gospel of Jesus Christ as foretold in the Old Testament and witnessed in the New Testament.

PARISH COUNCIL PRESIDENT

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Last month, over Labor Day weekend, I had a wonderful opportunity to attend a Christian rock music festival called “Rock the Light”. It was held at Youthfront South camp, where our EOYC campers have been for the last several years. Though many were camping in tents and RVs on the property, we were housed in one of the cabins in a prime location, right next to the pool. (For those of you familiar with Youthfront, it was cabin 22- go ahead, be jealous!). My purpose in attending this event was to enjoy some relaxation (rare enough in my life, as in yours I’m sure), to hang out with my sisters (Christine and John’s sister Cindy), and to share a great experience with Andrea and Elena. Parents, think about how unusual it is to find an activity which you enjoy that also thrills your kids. This was a whole weekend of listening to and singing along with great live music, worshipping God, eating greasy junk food, playing at the pool, running from a downpour, and hanging out in the cabin playing computer games. Heaven on earth, I assure you!

As we were learning worship and praise songs which were native to most of the rest of the Rock the Light attendees, it came to me that Orthodox Christianity and mainstream Protestantism, while both based on a faith in Jesus Christ, have much to learn from each other. The completely natural link between singing songs about Jesus and, in the next breath, learning about sponsoring a child in a foreign country through Compassion International or providing clean drinking water in Haiti and Africa by buying D’LO water, really touched something in me. For our Protestant brothers and sisters, to love Christ is to love the poor and the needy and the sick and the hurting, and to pour that love out with sacrificial giving. It’s just part of who they are.

Contrast that with our attitude, sometimes, as Greek Orthodox Christians. We are an amazingly generous people, by and large, within our own families and even within our own church communities. Look at how quickly the pledges came in to beautify our sanctuary with icons-tremendous! Think harder, though, about how we relate to outside giving beyond our church walls. Do we treat our “treasures” as though they belong to God and He is just lending them to us to see what we’ll do with them? Do we see a man or woman down on their luck and immediately judge them, or do we see Christ in them and immediately wonder how we can help? There are so many opportunities in our community to demonstrate our love for Jesus Christ and our commitment to Him. Walk around the social hall and the hallway to the classrooms and read the posters, some Sunday. Ask a Philoptochos officer what we are doing for philanthropy, and how you can help. Talk to Fr. Nick or a parish council member about where your stewardship dollars are put to work, and what the needs of the church are.

Pray about what God would have you giving, as we meet as a general assembly this month to approve the annual budget for 2012. Is it time for the Greek Orthodox Christian Church to learn from the mainstream Protestant church and give joyfully, sacrificially, and to the very utmost of our ability?

Highlights of September Parish Council meeting

Divine Liturgy was celebrated for the Elevation of the Holy Cross, so the meeting started close to 7:30, with a quorum present. The following topics were discussed:

- Approval of August minutes, review and approval of Treasurer's Report
- Debriefing regarding the Paneyiri was held, with discussions of how to continue to improve this celebration for next year
- The church office computers need updating- will likely be able to accomplish this using several which have been donated to the Sunday School
- Ongoing discussion regarding use of remaining food from Festival 2011- "Grecian Dinner" vs. using the food for St. Mary of Egypt dinner and/or New Year's party
- Waterproofing of fence posts surrounding HVAC unit on the roof
- Covering/ protecting the St. Dionysios icons
- Tasking the Beautification Committee with an over-arching "Master Plan" for the sanctuary and narthex
- Bylaw revisions nearly ready for approval by Parish Council and then on to General Assembly and finally to the Metropolitan for ratification
- Storage room to be locked with combination lock to prevent theft of food and supplies
- Gatherings to be hosted in various homes of PC members (by zip code and family groups) to discuss ministries at St. Dionysios and meeting the needs of the parishioners
- Update of church website and festival website planned
- Water still running under back door of social hall- various plans discussed
- Agendas for October parish council meeting and general assembly planned
- Exhortation by Fr. Nick to remember that we are Christians first and foremost, and that the parish council needs to lead by example



Luke the Evangelist
October 18th

This Apostle was an Antiochean, a physician by trade, and a disciple and companion of Paul. He wrote his Gospel in Greek after Matthew and Mark, after which he wrote the Acts of the Apostles, and dedicated both works to Theophilus, who, according to some, was Governor of Achaia. He lived some eighty-six years and died in Achaia, perhaps in Patras, the capital of this district. His emblem is the calf, the third symbolical beast mentioned by Ezekiel (1:10), which is a symbol of Christ's sacrificial and priestly office, as Saint Irenaeus says.



Demetrios the Myrrhbearer & Great Martyr of Thessaloniki
October 26th

Saint Dimitrios was a Thessalonian, a most pious son of pious and noble parents, and a teacher of the Faith of Christ. When Maximian first came to Thessalonica in 290, he raised the Saint to the rank of Duke of Thessaly. But when it was discovered that the Saint was a Christian, he was arrested and kept bound in a bath-house. While the games were under way in the city, Maximian was a spectator there. A certain friend of his, a barbarian who was a notable wrestler, Lyaeus by name, waxing haughty because of the height and strength of his body, boasted in the stadium and challenged the citizens to a contest with him. All that fought with him were defeated. Seeing this, a certain youth named Nestor, acquaintance of Dimitrios', came to the Saint in the bath-house and asked his blessing to fight Lyaeus single-handed. Receiving this blessing and sealing himself with the sign of the precious Cross, he presented himself in the stadium, and said, "O God of Dimitrios, help me!" and straightway he engaged Lyaeus in combat and smote him with a mortal blow to the heart, leaving the former boaster lifeless upon the earth. Maximian was sorely grieved over this, and when he learned who was the cause of this defeat, he commanded straightway and Dimitrios was pierced with lances while he was yet in the bath-house, As for Nestor, Maximian commanded that he be slain with his own sword.
